HIPAA 5010



Important Dates

- Regulation went into effect 3/17/2009
- Level I Compliance by 12/31/2010
- Level II Compliance by 12/31/2011



The CMS Medicare Fee-for-Service schedule*

- Level I April 1, 2010 through December 31, 2010*
- Level II January 1, 2011 through December 31, 2011*
- Fully compliant on January 1, 2012*

Definition of Levels

- Level I compliance means "that a covered entity can demonstrably create and receive compliant transactions, resulting from the compliance of all design/build activities and internal testing.“*
- Level II compliance means "that a covered entity has completed end-to-end testing with each of its trading partners, and is able to operate in production mode with the new versions of the standards.“*

Other Information

- HHS permits dual use of existing standards (4010A1 and 5.1) and the new standards (5010 and D.o) from the March 17, 2009, effective date until the January 1, 2012 compliance date to facilitate testing subject to trading partner agreement.*

Important Dates

- Implementation 10/1/2013 for all claims, including outpatient claims with dates of service, and inpatient claims with dates of discharge on and after October 1, 2013.

Differences in ICD-9 and ICD-10

ICD-9 CM

- Codes are 3-5 digits in length
- Over 14,000 codes
- Chapters 1-17 uses all numeric characters, supplemental chapters use an alpha first digit (E or V)

ICD-10 CM

- Codes are 3-7 characters in length
- Total 68,000
- Digit 1 is alpha (A-Z, not case sensitive), digits 2 and 3 are numeric, and digits 4-7 are alpha or numeric
- Significant increases in the number of codes
- Use current medical terminology
- Includes increased clinical detail
- Includes additional information relevant to ambulatory and managed care encounters
